

The Value of Human Life

Pressure for the liberalisation of the law on euthanasia has grown considerably in recent days. When one further explores this pressure, it becomes plain that the fundamental objective is not concerned with pain but rather with a very individualistic, philosophical commitment to human autonomy and the belief that if I am sick and want to end my life then I should have the freedom to do so via euthanasia or assisted dying.

The Church cares deeply about alleviating the suffering of God's people in the world. Christ himself said, ""Come to me, all you who labour and are burdened, and I will give you rest." (Mt 11:28) However, the Church also recognizes that suffering is an inescapable aspect of life and that this suffering ultimately unites us to God and helps us see our sheer dependence on him.

Our awareness is shaped by humanity's thousands of years of reflection and by our actions as Christians in following Jesus. He showed most fully what it means to love, to serve, and to be present to others. His response to the suffering of others was to suffer



with them, not to kill them. He accepted suffering in his life as the pathway to giving, to gener-losity, to mercy. The values of Jesus of Nazareth are the basis for our views on assisted dying. We have nothing to fear in committing ourselves to these profoundly human and life-giving values.

There are a number of religious views on euthanasia, but from a biblical perspective, God has made us rational and volitional beings. As such we have a God-given mind and will through which we are to live our lives by choice and not coercion. We are accountable to God for our decisions.

Ward's uluru Adventure

I recently had a wonderful opportunity to go on a trip to Uluru in outback Northern Territory with my husband Chris and my father-in-law Maurice. Maurice, 83yrs old, wanted us to help him drive his 23ft Caravan, towed by a 4 wheel drive Range Rover 3,000 km to the Red Centre of Australia. We left on the 15 August and travelled along the top part of NSW passing through (and often staying overnight in towns like Port Augusta and Coober Pedy (just fantastic) and then to Uluru (the big Red Rock) in the Northern Territory. What a magnificent sight Uluru is!

There were hundreds of people climbing the Rock, however out of respect for the Indigenous people we did not. It looked absolutely scary anyway given how high it is and how we could see people struggling to get up there. So off we went on a trek around it instead. What a truly magical place. It has such a spiritual vibe there. I felt so close to nature and God, way out there in the middle of Australia. I spent many nights gazing at the stars and the wonder of the Universe. Prayers came so easily to me and I could feel the Holy Spirit's presence so strongly. I felt so protected by Him our whole trip.



During our stay near Uluru we also visited the Olgas and the MacDonnell Ranges. All of them are 'must see' if you ever get the chance. There was so much to see and do, not to mention how friendly the people were. It was such a long way but boy did we see some sights! After leaving Alice Springs we headed towards home through Mt Isa (Chris' place of birth), Julia Creek and Richmond where sadly our trip came to an abrupt halt when the poor old Range Rover packed it in and we were stuck on the side of the road. RACQ came to our rescue after a 3 ½ hour wait. The RACQ tow people were so wonderful to us, taking us back to Richmond and setting us up in the lovely caravan park, where we stayed for 3 days whilst arrangements were made to tow the car and caravan back home to my father-in-law's house in Kooralbyn. We then caught a bus to Townsville and flew home from there.

Whilst in Richmond I had the absolute pleasure of attending Mass on Sunday morning, where I met some of the local parishioners and Father Mobin who is a very good friend of Father Subin. The Richmond community is small but vibrant. It has a beautiful lake. The town won the Tidiest Town Award a few years back and I could sure see why. It is so clean and everyone so friendly and accommodating, with lots of people helping us with arrangements for our travel back home with the aid of RACQ (and The Holy Spirit). So all in all it was a fantastic experience.

Despite my husband's inability to breastfeed he helps out in many other ways, like changing nappies, bathing, bottle feeding, and of late, feeding solids. Research has shown that a lot more men are becoming more hands-on, or as The Fathering Project (https://thefatheringproject.org/fatheringfacts/) puts it "Dadding differently". According to their studies 90% more dads regularly change nappies, compared with 69% of the previous generation (dad's with kids over the age of 30), and this definitely deserves an almighty cheer from a very tired mum. 

During those years Jill was in charge of our group, with prayers, help and advice. Her calmness was evident at all times. Jill supported St Patrick's in every way she could. I call her "wonder worker" she was a brick, as the saying goes.

Jill taught us how to speak to God from our hearts - if you listen you will receive an answer in your mind. After she moved away, she would give us sound advice. Priests and nuns would call on her for prayers and help. She became known as our mother for that's how she treated us, like her children. We loved her and she knew it and always returned our love and prayed for us all.

She often pointed her finger at me saying "Betty, you're not listening!". So much so that I wrote a poem called "You're Not Listening". Ahah, I pray she is looking down on her children, for she was oozing with love. God loves you, Jill and so do we!
