Over the years, my reasons for attending mass have changed as my faith has grown (unlike my height), and my attendance to youth group has become more regular.

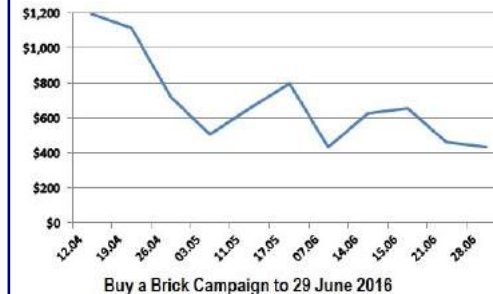

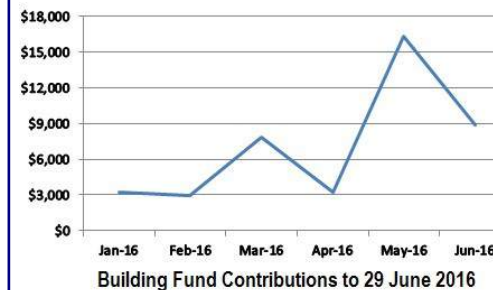
Building Program Update

UP-COMING FEASTS

4th August—The Feast of St John (Jean-Marie) Vianney, patron saint of priests.

In 1818 appointed parish priest of Ars (Cure d'Ars), a town of 230 inhabitants. He worked so hard to restore the damage done to the faith by the French Revolution that by 1855 the number of pilgrims to Ars had reached 20,000.

8th August—Saint Mary of the Cross Mackillop

We celebrate the first feast day of our first Australian Saint, with celebrations at schools, parishes and churches across Australia, including at St Joseph's.

15th August—Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

We celebrate that according to our Catholic faith, the Holy Mother, "having completed her course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory". This belief is ancient, dating back to the apostles themselves.

14 September—Feast of the Cross

Commemorates the cross used in the crucifixion of Jesus and celebrates the cross itself, as the instrument of our salvation.

MULTICULTURAL MASS

Welcome to all parishioners and guests to this year's Multicultural Mass, celebrated on Sunday 21st of August. As in previous years, the 9am Mass will be very special with beautiful ceremony and music. After the mass we meet up in the St Joseph's School Hall for a morning with multicultural music, entertainment and of course food.

A HOLY IKON IN OUR CHURCH



Many people may not realise it, but we have a precious Holy Ikon in St. Patrick's Church—in full view, next to the Holy Family sculpture and above the votive candle stand. It is the sacred painting of Our Lady of Perpetual Succour (Help), a celebrated ikon of the Catholic Church which has a history going back nearly 800 years. It has been revered by successive Popes, and is associated with many miracles. On Saturday mornings in our Church, it is set in a place of honour in front of the Altar, for the duration of the wonderful 8 a.m. Holy Hour instituted by our Parish priest, Father Joseph Kanatt.

According to the Catholic Encyclopaedia, this precious Ikon originated in the Eastern Orthodox Church where Ikon-painting was practised by skilled monks in the 13th Century, and is first recorded on the island of Crete. It survived theft, warfare, demolitions and concealment for 200 years, before coming under the care of the Redemptorist Order and eventually being venerated in the Church of Saint Alfonso di Liguori in Rome, where it remains today under Papal protection.

This original wooden Ikon measures 17 by 21 inches, painted on nut wood, with a gold leaf background. It depicts the Blessed Virgin Mary holding the Christ Child, and was originally named "Virgin (or Theotokos—Mother of God) of the Passion". On the left is the Archangel Michael (marked "OAM" in Greek letters) and on the right is the Archangel Gabriel (OAI). Mary's figure is marked "MP-OY" (Mother of God), and the Christ Child is indicated by "Ic-Xc". There is a tradition that it is a true copy of a painting by the Apostle Luke.

It is recorded that, by Papal permission, 2,300 facsimiles of the Ikon were printed and distributed to Catholic (usually Redemptorist) Churches throughout the world, to feature in weekly Novena prayers. Many of them have also featured in miraculous occurrences, including healing people beyond medical help. It is one of these true, and blessed, facsimiles that Fr. Joseph has provided for the congregation of St. Patrick's, and which we gather to venerate in our treasured Saturday Holy Hour.

The Holy Hour itself begins with 8 a.m. Holy Mass and Holy Communion. This is followed by the Novena prayers to Our Lady of Perpetual Help, and finally, there is a short Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament with prayers of adoration, followed by Benediction. This special offering to the Holy Trinity and Our Lady takes less than 60 minutes. It is something quite new for St. Patrick's—an inspiring and enriching experience to start the weekend. For those who wish to do further devotions, the regular 9 a.m. Saturday Rosary follows in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel, featuring the Five Joyful Mysteries.

Both are held on Saturday morning, to enable working people, families and children to take part. The official Feast Day of Our Lady of Perpetual Help is June 27.

ST VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY

Chapter 2: HOW AND WHERE DID THE SOCIETY DEVELOP IN QLD?

The economic depression in 1893 prompted the foundation of the society in Qld. At the same time, a disastrous flood of the Brisbane River caused great hardship, particularly to the poor. Later a drought increased the tragedy. As the Red Hill area of Brisbane was one of the poorest in the city, Father J. Hegarty, called a meeting of his parishioners and the first Saint Vincent de Paul Society conference in Queensland was founded on 18th February 1894 at Red Hill (St Brigid's).

For some years the conference operated in isolation as there was some reluctance by the clergy to expand. However, a minor recession and expenditure at the Boer War in Africa depleted government treasuries to such an extent that the need for organised lay charities became urgent. Finally the archbishop gave his approval and a second conference was founded at St Stephen Cathedral on 13th June in 1903.

The early establishment of the Society was not easy. Perhaps this was because the concept of a lay organisation with a spiritual commitment was something new. A report presented to the Catholic Congress in Melbourne in 1904 suggested that :

People were quite ignorant about the aims and objectives of the Society.

There was a feeling that other societies already established would suffer if some of their members joined the Society.

“The Australian has been called ‘the spoilt child of destiny’ because the sunny climate in which he lives tends to fit him for the merry side of life. Field sports are received more favourably than acts of self-denial. Possibly this is due –to a certain extent- to a lack of parental discipline in early life
– a frequent sin of omission in Australia.”

However, with increasing social problems, the spirit of dedication prevailed and other conferences were established at St Joseph's, Kangaroo Point in 1904; St Patrick's, Fortitude Valley and Holy Cross Woolloowin in 1905; and St Mary's, South Brisbane in 1906.

Since those days, the Society has been well accepted. There are now 220 conferences in Queensland, well over 3000 conference members and around 6000 volunteers involved in Charity Centres and other special works. More than \$15m was spent on providing assistance to the needy last year to help almost 350 000 persons.

Today , the society extends to all parts of Queensland in eight dioceses: Toowoomba, Rockhampton, Townsville, Far North Queensland, Western, South Coast, Northern and South/City.

Also, there is a variety of conferences across the State: parish conferences which can be home visitation only or a combination of home visitation and support centre where people can drop in; or family support centres only. There are special works conferences for youth, mental health and other purposes.

ROSIES

VOLUNTEER WITH ROSIES in BEENLEIGH



Rosies is a volunteer-based not for profit organisation that commenced in Queensland in 1987. Today, we have grown to reach out to all of our friends on the street, in the courts, detention centres, prisons, and drop-in centres. As a Rosies volunteer we provide unconditional acceptance and friendship to people who are marginalised within our community – especially those who are homeless, at risk of homelessness or simply lonely.

In Beenleigh we hold our street outreach at the train station from 7 to 9pm every Thursday and Saturday nights. We have an outreach room thanks to St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School, where we store our supplies and start the night at 6pm, ending with a debrief after outreach. Volunteers commit to one outreach a month and will be placed in a team. As a volunteer we also commit to –

- Being there irrespective of weather
- Socialize with our friends without prejudice
- Provide a cuppa and a bite to eat
- Provide other basic support needs
- Connect with services or support agencies.

We are lucky to receive great bakery donations from the Logan Village Family Bakery, and also hot meals from Dining with Joy. The Ormeau Lions Club has just given our outreach a generous donation of Coles Vouchers. We are very grateful. There are times when we require supplies like blankets, jackets, coffee, sugar, milk, cordial, serviettes etc. At the moment though, the Beenleigh outreach is in need of some more volunteers who will be happy to be committed for the long term. Volunteering with Rosies really is a great experience.

Long time St Patrick's Parishioner Mrs Thea Von Stein turned 100 on the 9th of July. Thea is an example of the multicultural nature of St Patricks. She was born in what was then Dutch Indonesia, where she no doubt acquired her liking for hot chillies, which she sais is a reason for her long life.

Thea grew up in Indonesia, met her husband and married. She had her first child, a boy, before the war and another boy after the war.

In 1950 Thea and her family arrived in Australia. They lived in a camp in Bathurst for a while. Her husband and a brother then went to Brisbane to look for work. Thea wanted to join her husband and he said "you can, if you can live in a tent". Thea brought the family to Brisbane via Sydney. The train trip from Sydney took over 24 hours, quite an ordeal with a young family.



Thea and her husband had two more children in Australia, a girl and a boy. They eventually settled in Beenleigh where they became parishioners of St Patrick's. Thea became a keen member of the Arts & Crafts Group, where she taught some of the ladies how to crochet and many of the ladies speak very fondly of her.

One of the many highlights in Thea's life was traveling to Italy and meeting the Pope, John Paul II.
