

The days we are experiencing are marked by a great void: void of rituals, void of faces, void of presences, void of contacts. A widespread and violent pandemic has taken away our certainties, our habits, our feasts, our meetings. A fear, mixed with disorientation and bewilderment, has taken hold of us. We feel lost, confused, blind. We cannot read what is happening very well, we cannot see or glimpse what it will be, how we will be, how and if we will resume our life.

Didn't the women on that first Easter sunrise feel that way? Weren't these the feelings of the disciples after the pain of Good Friday and the silence of Saturday? Wasn't their drama like what we are experiencing? The Master's place at the table was now empty, the centre that made them a community was lost, the holy city strange and empty, weakened friendship from betrayal and infidelity. And even when a new and strange hope pushed them to go out, they found themselves in front of this tomb ... empty...

We should therefore not escape this feeling too quickly. Educated on Good Friday and Holy Saturday, we Christians should

know how to stand in the face of death, before the grave, in front of the silence of God and men. The joy of Easter is not a banal happy end of the story of Jesus, it is not the happy end of the Gospel for which they all lived, nor is it the cancellation of the pain of the world or the simple removal of the many bleeding wounds of history.

Easter joy, the real one, is born and consists precisely in a new ability to look at emptiness, to dialogue with pain to see the signs of death and believe. From this emptiness we each experience in our unique way, Christ is living and breathes His Spirit of life upon us and on the Church. Easter is still a new creation and the chaos of the world finds order and beauty through it. And God gives us His eyes to see the good things He does for those who believe and hope in His love.

QGA - Why do Catholics go to Mass?

People who know next to nothing about the Catholic Church do know one thing - that Catholics **have** to go to Mass on Sundays. Until fairly recently, this idea of compulsion lay at the back of the minds of many Catholics which led them to go to Mass largely out of a sense of obligation and out of fear of God's wrath. Today most Catholics would agree that the above viewpoint is misleading for three reasons -

It makes God out to be tyrant who is out to get you to kow-tow to him.

It makes Jesus out to be God's henchman who came to tell us what to do.

It makes the Church out to be an organisation set up by Jesus to make sure we comply.

Most Catholics today realise that none of these statements are true. And none of them accurately represents the belief of Catholics today. The majority of Catholics today go to Mass on Sunday because they believe it is central to their lives as Christians. Catholics do not think of the Mass as a **church service** which they attend. The Mass is an **action**. It is something Catholics **do** together. They are not spectators **at it**; they are deeply involved **in it**.

At Mass they re-enact what Jesus did at the Last Supper. Paraphrasing Luke's gospel "after taking bread, breaking it, blessing it first, then the wine - he said, "**Do this in remembrance of me**". The words of Jesus "Do this in remembrance of me" have been obeyed without interruption for nearly 2000 years. Every time Catholics gather for Mass, they know they are there to do what Jesus did. And they believe that in that action Jesus, who died on the cross and was raised to life three days later, is made present for them.

Catholics believe that the Mass is a celebration of Christ's presence among us. In the Mass Catholics believe they meet with Christ and that their prayers are united with his.

The Mass is a sacred action which has a depth of meaning impossible to put into words. That is one reason why Catholics never tire of the Mass. As they go to Mass over weeks and months and years they enter more deeply into its mystery and get a bit more insight into its significance and its meaning for their own lives.

So, if you asked several Catholics why they go to Mass and what it means to them you would probably get a lot of different answers. Here are some of the things they might say -

"The Mass teaches you to accept God's gifts gratefully - you can never be worthy of them".

"Communion is the most important part for me - it's such a privilege to receive the Body of Christ".

"If I did not go to Mass, I'd forget about God altogether. It keeps me in touch".

"It's a weekly reminder that there is more to life than increasing one's standard of living".

"I bring my worries with me to Mass and offer them to God".

"For me, the Mass is **Worship.** I am not the centre of the universe, God is. At Mass I acknowledge that"

"At Mass I leave all my worries behind and focus on what really important in my life".

"The Mass isn't just for ME it's for US. We are a community of believers and the Mass holds us together".

"Celebrating Mass for me awakens me to the words of Jesus and his life and sacrifice - it makes me more fully aware, more fully alive".

There is a lot more we could say about the Mass, but enough has been said to show that for Catholics the Mass is not a weekly chore. Its something very precious to them. That is why it plays such a central part in their lives.

The end of an Era

It is with great sadness that members of St Patrick's Conference, St Vincent de Paul, announce the closure and demolition of their premises, in the Parish grounds.

The building, which has served the Parish and the local community so well over the past 33 years, has been deemed unsafe and "condemned" and will be removed from its present site. Since the closure of the upstairs accommodation for safety reasons, the teams have been working under extremely difficult conditions for both volunteers and the companions they strive to assist: with no proper office space, privacy for companions, on site toilets, running water or storage. Full credit to them for the wonderful job they continue to do, fulfilling God's instruction – "Do not pass by a man in need, for you may be the 'hand of God' to him". (Proverbs 3:27)

We believe that the Conference's origins date back to the 1974 Floods when a group of parishioners came together to help those in urgent need, at that time. They later provided assistance from premises in City Road, until the then Albert Shire Council offered SVDP the present building to be moved onto Parish land.

Permission was given by the Archdiocese for this move which was paid for by SVDP. We believe this happened in 1988 as buildings were being moved to make way for the "ring road". So the Conference has been an important and visible part of our Parish for almost 50 years and, we hope, will continue to be so. Over the years, many volunteers could be mentioned but we will not go there at the risk of leaving people out. Suffice to say, there were many excellent members who kept the Conference going.

However, there are 2 volunteers who should receive a special mention. Fay O'Toole is our present President and has filled this position several times previously as well as serving her time as Regional President and as part of the Formation and Training Team, who travelled to other areas helping them set-up and manage their Conferences. And also Jo Blocksidge, a faithful, reliable volunteer over many years, always ready to fill in if anyone was ill or unavailable and who managed the team Roster so competently.

But being a volunteer has personal benefits too. In retirement, it has given many of us a sense of purpose and a concrete way of fulfilling God's message to care for one another. And many wonderful friendships have been formed and maintained through our involvement with the Society. Our Conference work covers a large area including Beenleigh, Eagleby and all areas within the border of Pimpama, Jacobs Well, Waterford and Tamborine Village. At first we provided mainly food, clothing and furniture, but as life has become more challenging for so many we find ourselves called on to assist occasionally with medications, transport costs and rent.

In this Financial Year we have assisted 1450 companions and their children at a cost of \$38.000. With advances in technology our methods of recording and reporting has changed dramatically over the last few years. Although this can be a challenge for some of our volunteers it had enabled much easier record sharing, allowing Head Office to better understand our companions' needs and showing accurately the volume of the assistance we undertake. In the beginning, Home Visits were the Society's main form of contact with companions. With the establishment of the House, we could help many more as they visited our premises. Now, with the pandemic and the demolition of the House, Home Visits will, once again, temporarily, become our main method of contact, as volunteers also work from their homes.

Our greatest wish would be that St Patrick's SVDP Conference could remain a very visible part of our Parish on a site that benefits:-

- (a) Parishioners, our greatest supporters, allowing them to see the fruits of their generosity.
- (b) St Joseph's School, as the children witness a working example of caring for those in need.
- (c) The Town.

We are the most active Charity in the area, welcoming all comers. No one leaves empty handed. Our prayers are for a site that would continue to tie the Conference's work closely and easily to its Catholic heritage.

which has been severely affected by Covid. We unfortunately had to cancel our Fundraising Dinner last year and were not able to conduct our Christmas Appeal, both important sources of funding. At this stage it is highly likely that we'll need to cancel the Dinner once again in 2021.

Together with an increased demand for our services this means that we are limited with the amount of help that we can provide to those needy members of our society. We therefore ask for your financial assistance in the following ways:

If you are able, please support this year's Winter Appeal at the end of May.

We have Poor Boxes at both church exits. An occasional dollar or two all adds up.

Support our Vinnies Shop. Our Beenleigh shop is struggling to make a profit.

Our main source of funding for emergency relief comes from revenue from all Vinnies shops. We know that there are constant demands on our parishioners but we simply ask that, if possible, you help our worthy cause if and when you can.



We discussed our reconciliation rock, what we could do to restore it and how we could achieve this through a combined parish and Aboriginal community working group. The group would be tasked with turning the front corner part of our garden which contains the rock into a beautiful space that can speak to us all of a hope-filled future permeated with love and respect. The details will be discussed and recommended in the working group and then presented to the parish.
