

A Hopeful Easter Message

For me personally, the Easter period this year is quite distinct. Heading into this Easter, it was hard to imagine rejoicing. I kept wondering instead, what is this world coming to? Lenten days were full of ominous news. Torrential rain and flood waters have impacted communities across south-east Queensland and NSW. The Russian invasion has devastated several Ukrainian cities, triggered a humanitarian crisis and fuelled insecurity around the world.

The world is coming to a place like the world into which Our Lord was born. Politicians were not "for the people". Babies were killed, thousands of civilians died, refugee crisis accelerated and all that affecting the global economy. It was into a world like ours that Jesus was born. It was a world like ours, with all its sin and fears and horror, that he took on his shoulders so it could be nailed to a cross. And it was a world like ours that woke up Easter morning to the startling, amazing news that none of the horror of the preceding days had any permanent power at all.

The death of Jesus is a death in struggle and pain. His sacrifice renews our lives. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see everything has become new (2 Corinthians 5:17). On Easter Sunday, every time we remember Jesus' blood and sacrifice, we remember that we are new creatures. Our tired souls are refreshed by his grace. Our old perspectives are renewed by his love. God does not promise a new world or new reality. Rather, God gives us a new perspective to seeing reality.

It is my prayer that in the midst of political and similar situations constantly fraught with uncertainty and tension, the Easter message of hope and a new reality in Jesus Christ will help to heal the heart-breaking situations around us.

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QSA - Religious Freedom, Free speech, & the Federal Election

Ever since the lead up to the Postal Ballot for the legalisation of gay marriage it became obvious that the Anti- Discrimination Laws in some states could be used to silence religious groups and indeed silence opponents of that legislation by inhibiting free speech.

In Hobart, Archbishop Julian Porteous distributed amongst Catholic families a pamphlet pointing out the Catholic position on Marriage titled "Don't mess with marriage "

He was immediately attacked by activists and referred to the Anti-Discrimination Commissioner. After 6 months of deliberation the complaint was withdrawn without the issue being resolved. Around this time both major political parties made commitments to pass federal Religious Freedom legislation that would override such laws to enable religious groups to teach their members in their tenets and belief in good faith.

Efforts by the government to bring such laws and the stated willingness of the Opposition to support such legislation, have recently failed to pass in the Parliament and the government has now shelved the process until after the coming election.

As the laws stand, the teaching of the Catholic position on marriage and other subjects is in danger of being prevented by Anti-Discrimination Boards in some states.

It behoves us as Catholics to stand up for our long held religious freedom in Australia and make our voices heard on this issue.

One way of doing this is to demand of our political candidates in the coming election, their position on this vital issue for us and for the Church.

We should insist on protection under the law for our right to practice our religion in its entirety, the education of children and people in faith, ethics, dogma, and our right to proselytise and to have our say in public discourse. Should you wish to avail yourself of further information on this topic the following links are provided for your convenience.

We are living in a hostile environment, and we need to point out to society that religious freedom is a fundamental human right enshrined in major statements by the UN the US constitution but now under threat in Australia.

"After the next election, it would be desirable for our Parliament to legislate a lean and clean *Religious Discrimination Act*. The *Religious Discrimination Act* and the *Sex Discrimination Act* should be harmonised to ensure that no school can discriminate against any child on the basis of their gender or sexual orientation; and that 'nothing in the *Sex Discrimination Act* renders it unlawful to engage in teaching activity if that activity is in good faith in accordance with the doctrines, tenets, beliefs or teachings of a particular religion or creed, and is done by, or with the authority of, an educational institution that is conducted in accordance with those doctrines, tenets, beliefs or teachings'

ASH WEDNESDAY & LENT

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent. As always Fr Subin celebrated Ash Wednesday with Masses at 7am and 7pm. They were solemn Masses asking parishioners to reflect and repent from sin.

The 40-day period (46 counting Sundays) of Lent represents Christ's time of temptation in the wilderness, where he fasted and where Satan tempted him.


Lent asks believers to set aside a time each year for similar fasting, marking an intentional season of focus on Christ's life, ministry, sacrifice, and resurrection.

The altar is decorated with the cross and a scene from the desert, where Jesus fasted for 40 days.

Archbishop Mark Coleridge's Lenten Pastoral Letter Led by the Spirit

Dear sisters and brothers,

"Grace be with you who love our Lord Jesus Christ with an incorruptible love"

Jesus is led by the Spirit into the desert where he fasts for forty days The same Spirit now leads the Church into the forty days of Lenten preparation for Easter when the desert becomes a garden as "death is swallowed up in victory" The Spir-

it can take us to some strange places, even to places we would rather not go, but always for the sake of love's transformation.

In 2016 the same Spirit led the Australian Church to begin a journey to a new place. The Bishops Conference decided for a Plenary Council to chart a course into the future consisting of two assemblies.

It was the Spirit who prompted the Conference's decision and still accompanies us. It has been a time of testing and of deep listening to the word of God rather than to other voices, like Jesus in the desert.

The Plenary Council has three phases – preparation, celebration, and implementation. The preparation phase ended with the first assembly in October 2021. Our plan was to have the first assembly face-to-face, but COVID-19 forced it online. Satisfactory, but a vastly different experience.

Now we are in the middle of the **celebration** phase, between the two assemblies. This fermentation time, a huge task of processing the raw material from the first assembly and agenda preparation for the second.

At the first assembly, many voices spoke, before discernment in smaller groups, producing the raw material for the complex work of collating and sifting.

The second assembly's agenda we hope will contain creative, practical, and affordable proposals designed to produce the change needed in the Church. Hopefully, the second assembly will be in Sydney in July.

The Plenary Council sought and gained papal assent. Pope Francis announced a worldwide Synod process climaxing with the Synod of Bishops in Rome 2023. The Plenary Council therefore must interweave with the wider Synod process, each enriching the other - many voices in the Church being heard. The **preparation** phase of the Council saw broad consultation, and you are now invited to speak your mind as part of the global Synod process. So, I ask: What would you say to Pope Francis about change in the Church not just in Australia but around the world?

At the conclusion of the Council's second assembly, begins the **implementation** phase. The results of the Council will be sent to the Holy See for confirmation, before become binding for the Australian Church. Hopefully Brisbane Archdiocesan will have a Synod afterwards to embed the changes into the life and mission of the Church.

Councils and synods are conversion needed to produce cultural change. The need for change was made clear by the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse; and by COVID-19. Nothing can be the same since the Royal Commission, nor the pandemic.

This is no time for turning inwards and looking just to our own institutional interests or a judgmental Church which never notices the plank in our own eye but makes a fuss about the splinter in another's eye. We need instead to be a humble, compassionate, and outward looking Church that asks how we might be more like Jesus who "came not to be served but to serve". That will require a practical, evangelical imagination: "Never see a need without doing something about it." - St Mary MacKillop. This is the kind of Church to which both the Plenary Council and the global Synod are looking. This is what the Spirit is now saying to the Church, speaking to all of us in these desert days of Lent.

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

OPENING PRAYER

O passionate Redeemer, the shadow of your suffering and death falls across our own path today, and we turn to you in faith. Because you have tread this way before us, humbly and gently, we trust in your presence. Bless us with strength, grace us with honesty, and embrace us with courage - as we pray.....

FIRST STATION - Jesus is Condemned to Death Reflection

Unjustly accused, Jesus stands condemned. He is subjected to merciless indignities. Those participating in the harassment of Jesus are not cruel and heartless persons. They are everyday folks like the two of us, caught in the fervour of the crowd. They are afraid: afraid of authentic authority, the Authority of Truth. They are afraid of change.

Praver

O condemned Redeemer and Author of life, we're afraid. There have been times when our fearfulness has not let us set aside our pride, our need for security, our need to be right; we have hurt and bruised each other. Reflecting on your own sentencing, Lord, we lower our eyes in sadness and sorrow. We have condemned that which is demanding of us. Forgive us and teach us to forgive each other.



SECOND STATION - Jesus Takes Up His Cross Reflection

Ah, the weight of that tree across human shoulders is tremendous. No rest; no morning meal. Jesus has been abused all night and is now burdened with the weight of his own crucifixion. Splinters slice his skin; the crowd roars in approval. There is no respite for him; none.

Prayer

O weary Redeemer, we know nothing of the weight of your cross. Yet, we do know the weight of crosses in our marriage, in our family. How often have we considered each other's little idiosyncrasies as burdensome, bothersome, heavy. How often have concerns for the kids, the budget and health problems pressed down on our



marriage to make us weary. We reflect on the weight across your shoulders and how your skin must have been chafed and torn. We ask for strength - strength to carry the weight with you today. There's nothing we bear that you haven't already carried for us.

THIRD STATION - Jesus Falls the First Time Reflection

Stumbling to the ground, Jesus is bruised and humiliated even further. The multitude that had once surrounded him looking for hope now surrounds him looking for a political scapegoat. What little strength Jesus has left is poured into his final steps of life.

Praver

O crushed Redeemer, we know the experience of failing. Again and again, the weight of sacramental love has brought us to our knees, sometimes in pain and humility, sometimes in praise and gratitude. We reflect on you buried under the weight of sin and



love. We ask for wisdom as we stumble to our feet to move ahead with hope, day by day.



FOURTH STATION - Jesus Meets His Mother Reflection

Their eyes meet and they exchange a knowing glance. Mary's heart, - a heart that once danced with joy as she watched her child toddle, walk and run - is ripped with pain as she watches her child crawl to his death; she is helpless. And Jesus; he feels his mother's pain and grieves - not for himself, but for the woman who said "Yes" to her role in bringing the Word to flesh.

Prayer

O tormented Redeemer, you come face to face with love and it adds to your pain. How many times we've felt helpless, unable to lift the agony from the body, heart or soul of our beloved. We reflect on this moment of love meeting love. We ask that our own moments of helplessness be life-giving and redeeming rather that crippling and debilitating.

FIFTH STATION - Simon Helps Carry the Cross Reflection

Jesus' strength ebbs away with each ragged step. Finally, Jesus is given a helping hand. A stranger yanked from the crowd is forced to slip his shoulder next to Jesus' to take on a hardship he neither asked for nor anticipated.

Prayer

O helpless Redeemer, a stranger is shoved against you, and the two of you haul the beam of death. We reflect on the shrouded privilege

this was for Simon, though he knew nothing of the role he was playing in redemption history. We, too, know nothing of the privileges hidden in the crosses we bear together. Unlike Simon, however, we willingly place our shoulders side by side, as wife and husband, soul-mates and partners in life, and tread through the years together. Jesus, Simon lead us.

SIXTH STATION - Veronica Wipes the Face of Jesus Reflection

A brief moment of compassion from a woman in the crowd brings a soft cloth against the tormented features of Jesus of Nazareth. Risking her own safety, Veronica is moved to offer the slightest relief to the Son of God. No swaddling clothes here, no comforting arms of reassurance; only a passing moment of risky tenderness.

Prayer O battered Redeemer, although a cloth against your face did little to ease the agony of your body, you were soothed with this

woman's courage and compassion. We reflect on her selflessness and the risk she took in that compassionate moment. We're capable of the same selfless giving for each other - but we so often fail, afraid to take the risk. We're afraid to step out of ourselves and risk losing - what? We don't even know. Imprint on our hearts our spouse's sweet goodness and engender in us the will to risk compassion and tenderness.

SEVENTH STATION - Jesus Falls a Second Time

Reflection Jesus falls again. Did he slip? Did he and Simon trip over each other? Was he shoved by some tormentor from the crowd? It doesn't matter. The cross gets heavier, and each rising seems progressively more impossible.

Prayer O bowed Redeemer, did you ask yourself how much further? Did you wonder if this time you might not be able to get up? We reflect on your second fall and remember our own experiences of being crushed - not by our misjudgements but by forces which we

seemed powerless to control. The grace of our sacrament, however, has brought us to our feet again and again. Teach us to trust that grace; let us not court hopelessness.





EIGHTH STATION - The Women Weep Over Jesus Reflection

There is no holier water than tears. Jesus' route to Golgotha is sprinkled with tears that cannot cleanse, heal or diminish the horror of this moment. These tears mingle with the sweat of Jesus' forehead and the moisture of his blood and thus join the waters of Jesus' baptism, anointing the Prince of Peace.

Prayer

O anguished Redeemer, tears are powerful. They can heal, cleanse, and nurture; they can also manipulate and inflict unwarranted guilt. While we reflect on the tears of the women of Jerusalem, we recall

our own tear-stained and tear-blessed moment. We recall how our shared faith journey has been sprinkled with tears: our own, our children's, our loved ones'. Bless our tears with fierce honesty that they may bear life.



NINTH STATION - Jesus Falls the Third Time Reflection

Three times, Jesus' knees are raw from the impact of jagged stones that slice his skin each time he falls. The weight of the beam crushes down across the back of his head, and he is blinded with pain. The crowd gets angrier with Jesus; in his crushed helplessness, their own broken humanity is mirrored back to them.

Prayer O prostrate Redeemer, we ponder in silence this scene of horror. Your powerlessness awakens in us our own sense of powerlessness. More than that, your third fall and the roar of the angry

erlessness. More than that, your third fall and the roar of the angry crowd shames us. Too many times we've identified with the anger of the crowd when our own weaknesses have been noted. Too any times we've failed to love each other when our expectations were crushed by reality. Soften our hearts; lift the weight of bitterness and resentment from our burdened souls so we can rise and walk together again in your footsteps.



Reflection Stripped, made naked. Jesus' brutalized body is bared for further humiliation, exposing him to the piercing glimpses of accusers, persecutors, and curious bystanders. He's made empty and utterly vulnerable. Only the eye of God covers him.

Prayer O bare Redeemer, nakedness is the symbol of our covenant that you modelled for us in your dying hours. Your nakedness points the way to vulnerable love. As we reflect on the garments ripped from your body, we see that garments of security, ego and control that we bind tightly to ourselves to hide our fear, vanity and false pride. Invite us into naked existence with each other - and cover us with the courage to respond.



ELEVENTH STATION - Jesus Is Crucified

Reflection Spike rips flesh; bone shatters. The Prince of Peace, Wonder-Counsellor, God-Hero, Sacred Way, Root of Jesse is bolted to a tree. The cross is then hoisted to an upright position. While Unconditional Love suffocates on the beams of a cross, the world waits and watches.

Prayer O crucified Redeemer, waiting is a cross. We have endured many waiting periods through the years of our marriage - not always with faith and grace. During some periods of waiting, we've clung to each other for reassurance. During others, however, we've pulled apart and cowered in the dark corners of our individual souls. We reflect on your final hours of suffering, suspended between the finite here and our Father's eternity. In the embrace of your arms, which reaches beyond the limits of the universe, we place our restless waiting. Sooth our impatience and frustrations; make gentle our seasons of holy waiting.






TWELFTH STATION - Jesus Dies on the Cross Reflection

He gives us his spirit. He lets go of life. He trusts that all things have been fulfilled: "It is finished." For Jesus, his suffering is over; for the crowd, the show is over; for us, a life of faith and joy is about to begin.

Prayer

O spent Redeemer, you let go of life just as you had taken hold of life: at the bidding of God. With no honours or fanfare, you entered life in the company of barnyard animals; with no respect or dignity,




THIRTEENTH STATION - Jesus is taken Down From the Cross Reflection

The saviour of the world, the Son of God, Emmanuel is pulled from the device of torture and death and cradled by loving arms. His body is pierced, torn, broken and lifeless. Meaninglessness defines the moment.

Prayer

O lifeless Redeemer, meaninglessness often haunts human life. We lie in each other's arms at night sometimes and cower before a chasm of meaninglessness. We do not face torturous death, but nevertheless we feel pierced, torn, broken, lifeless - and in those mo-

ments, empty. We reflect on the mystery of your death and pray for the faith to trust that your grace redeems our meaningless spaces.



In the quiet dusk of the afternoon, Jesus' body is hauled to the tomb of a stranger. Fearing harsh treatment from Roman guards, his friends hastily prepare his body for burial, position the boulder across the entrance to the tomb, and scurry away. Tomb time begins.

Prayer

O enshrouded Redeemer, darkness envelops your lifeless body.

Only the God you know sees you now. We cannot see your goodness, your laughter, your misery. We've stared into the darkness of the tomb; we've been blind to each other's goodness, laughter, and yes - misery. We reflect on this darkness; we have to trust that we will not see resurrection dawn without treading Holy Saturday hours.

Closing Prayer

O risen Redeemer, your promise to us is hope; your gift to us is life. As we ponder the splendour of that first Easter dawn and feel the stirrings of joy deep within, we renew our covenant of fidelity - to you and to each other. We open ourselves to the daily mysteries of our sacrament, bless each other with mutual love, and commit ourselves - again - to follow you along this path we have chosen in faith. Amen.
